Film on the experience of psychosis - 'Pip, Pop and a Pandemic' (Meeting Room 1) Chair: Dr.Jed Boardman

Interview with Producer/Director of 'Pip, Pop and a Pandemic' Tracy Willits. Pip Pop and a Pandemic – A documentary exploring the inequalities and the large gap in life expectancy for people with a serious mental illness.

Recently shown in Parliament with a Call to Action (November 2023) and submitted as evidence to the Covid-19 inquiry, this moving and intimate documentary gives a voice to vulnerable people and raises challenging questions about the benefits system. Pip, Pop and a Pandemic follows two couples through lockdown and shows how their lives in Northeast England were turned upside down by a mental health crisis and global pandemic. It reminds us of the large gap in life expectancy for people with a serious mental illness who tend to die 15 to 20 years younger than the general population. Set against the beautiful backdrop of the Northumberland coast the film is raw and emotional and ultimately tragic, but with two love stories at its heart is told with both humour and warmth.
