Alongside the Scottish Government, we as a College signed up to a Memorandum of Understanding committing to work with partners to end these practices.

It is important that the legislation is clear and unambiguous in its wording so that healthcare practitioners can continue to offer spaces for people to explore issues around their gender and sexuality. As there is emerging evidence in this field, we would want any legislation to have the flexibility to accommodate changes in patient-centred best practice.
